Our Strategy to 2025

David Jordan OBE, former Director of Operations at the Environment Agency, has been Chairman of the Board of Trustees for Excellent Development since 2015. Here, he shares his vision and strategy to widen the application of sand dams, bringing clean water to millions of the world's poorest people.

"Whenever I go on a trip, be it a visit to friends and family, a holiday or a trip to see the great work of Excellent Development delivering water and soil conservation to some of the poorest communities in the world, I have to plan my journey. However I get there, be it by bus, train, car or plane, my final destination is clear in my mind. Organisations also need to know where they are heading and Excellent Development is no exception. That's why I am delighted to have published our strategy in October 2017.

"At the very heart of our strategy is an ambitious goal. By 2040, we want half a billion people living in the driest parts of the world to have access to a clean and secure supply of water. Water poverty is a growing issue which desperately needs to be tackled – so even as a small charity, we need to think big.

"Focusing on what we want to achieve is important. So too is working out how we are going to deliver.

"First, we will continue to help fund local groups to build sand dams where they are needed most. So we aim to invest in 100 sand dams each year, increasing to 200 a year by 2025, in some of the world's driest places where people really need them.

"We know we can help more families living in dry places by working in partnership with larger organisations. We will achieve this by promoting the benefits of sand dams to key players, using the impressive results of our early pioneering work in parts of Africa. Collaboration is the best way we can accelerate investment in sand dams to tackle water poverty.

"Our focus now is delivery. Sand dams are great value and just need a little investment to get going. That's why your support is so important. Thank you for everything you've done to enable communities to completely transform their lives with sand dams. I hope you will continue to be a part of our movement to widen the application of sand dams across the drylands of the world."



EXCELLENT SAND DAM EXPEDITION

8 – 14 July 2018

Have you ever thought about rolling up your sleeves and helping to build a sand dam, side by side with a Kenyan community? This year, Excellent are organising a Sand Dam Expedition, taking place on 8 – 14 July 2018. It's a once-in-alifetime opportunity to join a community as they transform their lives with sand dams and climate-smart farming.

This year, the expedition group will be staying in Tawa, a peaceful market town in the mountains of southeast Kenya, located nearby to many of the communities that we are working with in 2018.

The week-long itinerary will allow for time spent building a sand dam and a farewell celebration with the host community. There will be the chance to visit other communities who have benefited from sand dams and farming training, and also some free time to fit in some of Nairobi's attractions on the journey home.

We also ask that participants contribute a suggested minimum donation of £500, to support our work with dryland communities, which you can fundraise from your family and friends or donate yourself if you prefer.

INACIA AND ELISA

Hope blooms in Tete

For the people of the Wirriam community, Tete Province, Mozambique, sand dams are having a transformative effect on their lives – in particular, for women.

Women like Inacia Kumbulane, mother of six, and grandmother Elisa Siedade. When they started building the sand dam, Inacia and Elisa hardly dared hope that it would bring a reliable supply of clean water to the dry, unforgiving land in which they grew up.

The poverty in Tete is so extreme that many parents are forced to marry off their young daughters for a dowry payment, just so they can feed their other children and pay medical bills. This means that many girls become mothers from as young as 12 years old. The land is so inhospitable to crops that for some people, their only source of food is a porridge made from berries found in the trees – and that is all they have to eat, day in, day out.

Women and children bear the heavy burden of collecting water. Before the sand dam was built. Inacia and Elisa would

Inacia Kumbulane, Wirrian Community, Tete Province, Mozambique spend almost every day looking for 20 – 40 litres of water, for drinking, cooking, cleaning and washing, for herself and her family.

In this once inhospitable land, Inacia and Elisa are now surrounded by budding papaya trees, flowering tomato plants, cabbages, onions, carrots, and lettuces, thanks to the sand dam they built together with their community. It seems nothing short of a miracle. In the blazing 35 degree heat, Elisa shares her hopes and dreams for the future:

"I am expecting to support my grandchildren through their education, also buying their clothes, their food, and medication for malaria."

Inacia is also thinking only of her family, and how these crops will benefit them. She tells us how it was impossible to grow such crops before, because there was simply no water to do so. She savs:

"Because we now have access to these crops, my family will not go hungry."

What was once a barren area of only Mozambican bush has been transformed into fruitful gardens, thanks to the hard work of the community. The Wirriam dam will provide a vital water source for thousands of Nyungwe men, women and children for generations to come, helping to end the cycle of poverty – and child marriages – in the area.

And with three more sand dams built in Tete Province in 2017, thousands more people can completely transform their lives with a reliable, year-round supply of water.

Ann Nussey and Vaughan Pomeroy


Vaughan Pomeroy and his late wife, Ann Nussey, dedicated a large part of their lives to supporting causes close to their hearts. Here, Vaughan shares the story of how they came to support Excellent.

"Ann died in October 2016, and this is really her story. We first met in 1994 and we married in 2001, which meant a complicated process of merging two independent lives. We began to look at our charitable giving, trying to move away from making a large number of very small donations on an ad hoc basis towards supporting a few charities that really resonated with us. Ann did most of the work and she was very careful, very thorough and very objective. The aim was to select charities that fitted our ideals and our priorities. We talked for a long time and decided that we wanted to make a real difference in key areas that became the four Ws - wellbeing, water. wildlife and women. We had both seen too much poverty, injustice and indiscriminate destruction of wild places.

"So, where does Excellent Development come in? Ann had worked for a year in Nigeria and had subsequently visited eastern and southern Africa. There, she had seen the problems faced by communities in gaining access to clean water, and the burden this placed on women in particular. She looked at a number of organisations that aimed to improve access to clean water in dry regions.

"The concept behind the sand dam seemed both simple and sustainable in the long term, with minimal maintenance. The more that Ann read the more enthusiastic she became. Excellent's approach ensured engagement with and commitment from the local communities, the benefit to women was central and health and wellbeing was improved by constant supplies of clean water. Perhaps most surprisingly, the change in local vegetation and ecology provided benefits for agriculture and wildlife. The projects delivered in each of the areas where we had determined to make a difference."

"From an early commitment to monthly donations we were encouraged to support some of the appeals with larger sums, convinced that the money would be used to benefit communities that desperately needed practical solutions. I chose to name Excellent Development as one of three charities that were closest to Ann's heart for donations in her memory, and it was amazing to hear that the community at Mumbuni had agreed to name their sand dam in her memory. She would have been very surprised but especially delighted to see the women from the community featured so prominently in the photographs. She knew from her experience that it is usually the women who make these projects successful. She found the vision of women spending many hours each day fetching water that is often unclean, just so that they can do the same tomorrow, upsetting. She wanted to make a difference. I will continue to support Excellent Development, as Ann and I agreed we should do, because the work is wonderful and it deserves support."

PLEASE DONATE

Here are some ways in which your donations could help people living in drylands to build sand dams, and make a living from farming:

- £15 could provide a dryland farmer with drought-tolerant seeds, to grow a reliable source of fresh food for their children
- £30 could supply a community with a rake, gardening fork, shovel and watering cans, to plant trees for fruit, fuel and fodder
- £60 could provide a community with a roll of barbed wire, to reinforce their sand dam and keep it anchored to the bedrock
- £80 could provide 500 seedlings and a spray pump, to protect the tree nusery from decimation by insects
- £120 could provide a community with a wheelbarrow and 10 bags of cement, to help them construct their sand dam
- £160 could provide a full set of 25 metal shovels
- £370 could provide a community with manure, organic pesticides and seeds to plant a shared growing plot
- £420 could provide all of the tools needed to build a sand dam
- £580 could provide all of the barbed wire and steel bars needed to reinforce a sand dam
- £950 could provide a furrow irrigation system, to supply water to a community dam
- £1300 could provide a community with a water pump and shallow well, to safely extract drinking water from the sand dam
